The people we support and their families tell us the move from home or college is one that can be difficult. You will be involved in every step from recruiting the support team and finding the right accommodation, to attending planning and feedback meetings to ensure things are staying on track. We also have a family charter which sets out our commitment to working with you, and outlines your personal preferences for how you'd like to stay involved and stay in touch.

Ready Willing, Able

Your son or daughter may like to benefit from our supported employment programme, Ready, Willing and Able, which aims to help people we support to secure meaningful work.

Creating Connections

People we support at SeeAbility can also benefit from our recently launched Creating Connections initiative, which aims to empower people to gain digital skills and thereby the confidence to connect with others and stay safe online. As a result of the programme, 9 in 10 people who took part say they now feel confident, or very confident, using technology.

SeeAbility's support and accommodation

SeeAbility provides highly specialist support for people with learning disabilities and autism. This specialist support is complemented by one of the most comprehensive in-house teams of specialists in the country.

This means that every person we support has access to the right kind of expert attention they need, when they need it. Our Specialist Support team includes consultant behaviour analysts, speech and language therapists, physiotherapists, and vision rehabilitation workers; this support can be provided as part of your son or daughter's support package when commissioned. Everything we do is underpinned by positive behaviour support.

All our services are registered with the Care Quality Commission (CQC) and we are proud to have one of the highest compliance levels in the social care sector, with 100% of our homes rated as 'good'.
