Accommodation

Barclay House is situated in a quiet residential area, within walking distance of the sea, the Seven Sisters cliffs, and the beautiful South Downs. It is an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, but also just a short journey from the major cultural hub of Brighton.

Barclay House has seven bedrooms and three of these have ensuite provision and two separate flats separate from the main building. The main home has a communal lounge, kitchen, and level access to garden areas.



The home is in a residential area where people get to know their neighbours and host their friends and family. Just next door is the Bradbury Centre – a day centre where people with learning disabilities from across the local area meet up to learn new skills and make friends.

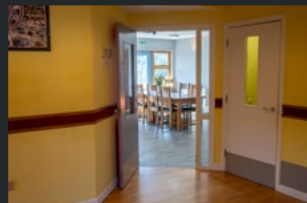
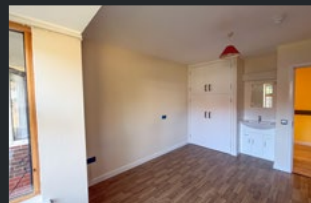

Our specialist support

SeeAbility is unique in providing in-house specialist support, including vision rehabilitation and, where commissioned, positive behaviour support (PBS).

Our focus is on encouraging people to challenge themselves to achieve their own goals and get the most out of life, while supporting increased independence and choice.

Vision rehabilitation

People with learning disabilities are ten times more likely to have sight problems, and it's vital they get the right support when they need it. The Vision Rehabilitation Team works with people who have vision impairments or sight loss to support them with increasing independence. That could be anything from learning to make a cup of tea, to learning a route to work.

Positive behaviour support

Our PBS specialists carry out functional assessments of any behaviour that is challenging a person and their team, working alongside the person supported, their family, and their support team. They work collaboratively to develop functionally equivalent skills, so the person can communicate in ways that meets their needs in a safe way.



Active support

90% of our teams are trained in Active Support, an approach to support that focuses on empowering people to take part in every day tasks, helping them to build their independence, confidence and skills.

This approach, across our homes, means our support is always challenging people to achieve more and take control of their lives.

Finding community at Barclay House

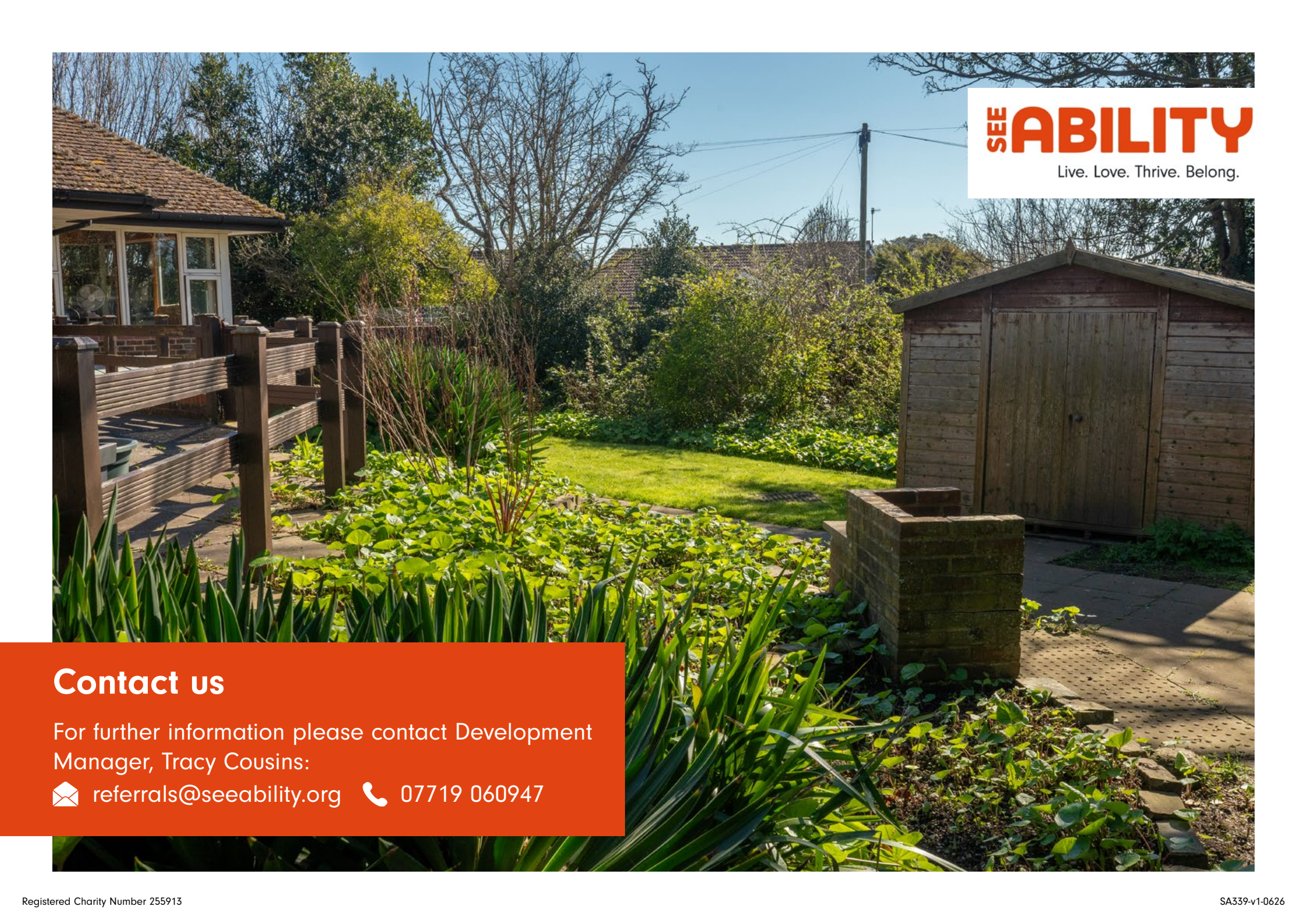
People living in Barclay House make close friends both among their neighbours and in the local area. We have a thriving volunteer programme, with many long-term volunteers building long-term friendships with people we're supporting.

We also have an activity centre just next door, the Bradbury Centre, where people living at Barclay House can, if there is an assessed need, learn valuable new life skills.



There is also plenty to do in the local area. From Barclay House, people have easy access to local coffee shops, world-famous walking and hiking trails, as well as the vibrant city of Brighton. The magic of Barclay House is that it can offer both the excitement of nearby Brighton, and the comfort of a quiet, relaxed home.

There are also SeeAbility-wide programmes that people can get involved with. Our Ready, Willing and Able programme supports people to find paid employment and build careers, and the Listen Up! team brings together people with disabilities to speak up about issues that matter to them.
